From the Rabbi Rabbi Cy Stanway

I recently came across a book review about the place of community in people's lives that really resonated with me. It is not a new idea but over the past couple of decades, its conclusions have become clearer and clearer. Many years ago it was intimated in the study which became a book called 'Bowling Alone.' Today's study builds on that reality and reveals its present-day manifestations and offers up its own challenges.

Community comes in many forms, of course, but the upshot of the study is that community is an impossible idea to define because each person defines it for themselves. For some, community is a devotion and dedication to an idea, a cause, an institution, etc. For others, it is a one-off experience where the offering of service is what is defined as community and adherence to a community such as this exists only as long as the need exists. A good example of this is reaching out to a synagogue when a funeral is needed and, once the need is met, the outreach to the synagogue will be over until the next need. This is not a judgement, but rather the reality of today's Jewish communities.

This is a big change in the definition of what a community is. In decades past, the community was experienced every Friday night. No, not at Shabbat services, but at the Friday football game at the high school. This is, to some degree but certainly not specific to small towns a smaller-town idea. The people shared a passion, a love for their home team and showed out to support. And while there, they would meet each other and when they needed each other, no one was a stranger.

The difference with today's communities is striking and the implications for Jewish life is also striking. We speak about the Jewish community and it typically means a couple of things: our local community and the greater, Jewish community. Both are easy to understand but the difference in today's world is that it is as easy to remain as anonymous in the local Jewish community as it is to remain anonymous in the larger Jewish community.



The Jewish community will have to adjust to this new reality. Jews on the Jersey Shore have every Jewish convenience they need or want. We do not need to have a 'Friday night football game community.' We can get anything: rabbi, cantor, holiday foods, b'nai mitzvah, weddings and funerals, and so forth. Our community is simply our friends and the structures of the Jewish community are our functionaries.

To some degree, it has been like this since the 1900's as Jews began to assimilate into Western European and American society. Today, though, the issue is much more acute and its consequences, as well.

As I see it, the shifting of the definition of community is of vital importance to the temple. To this end, we will need to explore how to deepen relationships with each other in new and innovative ways. We will need to evolve what it means to be part of a temple to address the new realities of Jewish life on the Shore.

In the coming months, we will be exploring these ideas which will affect the direction of the temple. You will be invited to participate as we will outreach to all our members and maybe even former members. Beth Miriam is going to define for Beth Miriam what Beth Miriam means to you who are part of this community.

This is, in a sense, uncharted territory and is like 'canoeing the mountain' - a phrase that refers to the Lewis and Clark expeditions in which Lewis was assured that, in order to traverse the continent, all he would have to do is paddle the length of the Missouri River which would take him to the Pacific Ocean. He never anticipated mountains!

We are in the same place. The truths are that the world in front of us is nothing like the world behind us; temple leadership will chart new directions and possibilities in the coming months; temple leadership will adapt to new realities; there will be challenges that we can't even think of but we, all of us, can overcome them if we seek to create a meaningful Jewish community in the traditional sense of community.

On a personal note, I would like to thank Harry Silverman who has served as our temple President for the past four years. Harry has guided the temple with devotion and self-sacrifice and has been a wonderful partner and confidante helping me to address the many challenges that often face a rabbi. He has approached issues with calm and clear-headedness and has been a trusted friend. Thank you, Harry.

From the President

Dear Fellow Congregants,

December 2018 is here, and the end of the year marks the end of my term as president of Temple Beth Miriam. After serving 4 years as your president, I will be handing the reigns over to Dr. Barry Edison. Barry is enthusiastic with a lot of new ideas. He grew up in TBM, and his family has a long history here. As Men's Club president, he successfully invigorated the Men's Club and can still lay claim to being undefeated in softball. That winning attitude will go a long way to providing new guidance for TBM.

TBM provides many outlets for those wishing to learn, engage and support. Rabbi Cy's weekly classes in Theology and Torah study are ongoing, with a new class, Adult Pirke Avot planned to start in 2019. Membership and Programming Committees provide activities for the young and old with dinners, movies, speakers, and our summer favorite beach service. Men's club and Sisterhood provide valuable funding for the temple, and activities for their members that are varied and exciting.

2018 has been a challenging year, but thanks to the staff and volunteers, it was business as usual for the congregation. In spite of heating and computer problems, staffing issues in the front

office, and air conditioner failures, the temple kept running.

We encountered a significant imbalance between income and expenses in 2018. The demographics of the area continue to change, families are still struggling financially, members are retiring and leaving the area, and the membership gap is not being filled. Overall, our expenses are being reduced, and thanks to a few significant donations the deficit was reduced. We are predicting stabilization in membership for calendar year 2018, and a renewed emphasis in 2019 to attract new members. We have to be innovative, and any ideas in this area would be appreciated.

Analysis of 2018 has begun; what I am finding is more of what was found the previous year. We have many families that have not met their commitment of dues or religious school payment, or require financial assistance. Recognizing that dues/religious school income will never meet our financial needs, we hold multiple fund raisers throughout the year to augment our income. Our largest fund raiser, the Kol Nidre appeal, did not meet its target. If you have not already donated, I urge you to re-consider. Unlike many charities, every dollar donated goes toward the temple and its many needs. Regardless of our situation, we will never deny a family membership privileges and will go out of our way to provide dues assistance and scholarships for the religious school to insure attendance.

We have been fortunate that monies invested years ago have provided us with the funds needed to bridge the gap between income and expenses. Those monies, invested primarily in corporate bonds have provided above average yields. As long as we don't have to touch the principal, those investments will continue to provide assistance. However, with current market conditions, an expected increase in interest rates, and a continuing deficit, the current business model is not sustainable for the long term.

We cannot continue to cut expenses and maintain the level of community that all of you expect. We need to increase our income through additional members and a more targeted fund raising. This will be an area of focus for 2019.

Our many committees are hard at work putting together programs for the coming year that will appeal to a variety of interests. If you have ideas for activities that you would like to see at temple, please contact the office or one of the committee heads. Their contact information can be found in any bulletin.

I have many people to thank for their support during my tenure as president. Rabbi Cy has been the person I go to when I have a question, and when faced with a task, he always volunteers to take it on when volunteers can't be found.

The religious school principal and the Cantor positions are led by experienced professionals. Fortunately, Stella Stanway and Cantor Marnie Camhi handle their areas without needing any input from me.

The executive board includes Mark Cohen, Barry Edison, Brian Gillet, Barry Edison, Wendy Slotter, and Michael Gross. They provide guidance and support, and generate policy and manage committees. When traveling, they stepped up and took on my role. A special thanks to Michael Gross, immediate past president whom I call on frequently for guidance.

Our board, which includes the executive board members and Alvin Goldman, Chase Kaplan, Danielle DelCuore, Lori Goldstein, Marian Gross, Pat Shapiro, Peter Grayson, Roy Dressner, Sandra Maseda, Steve Silver, and Stuart Lippsett. In addition, we have many past presidents that still have an active interest in the temple, and support the board and many committees. I am proud to recognize Brian Gillet, Michael Gross, Cindy Singer, Gary Pess, and Judy Berg. Finally, I would like to recognize new additions to the temple board for 2019: They are, Phil Falcone, Fred Eckhaus, Kathy Cohen, David Nussbaum and Kara Zappacosta. These new members will get involved in committees that they are passionate about, and their new ideas will help direct TBM to a successful 2019.

Temple Beth Miriam has been in existence for 127 years because previous generations saw fit to insure its future through generous funding over and above what was needed for the day to day operations. Through fundraising, and an emphasis on membership, I am hoping that we can reverse the present trend, and put the temple on a sound financial footing. Please help us achieve our goals through your generous donations, and support for your new president, Barry Edison and your Board. As we move forward, I invite you to nurture your relationships and engage. We have many needs and opportunities, for single projects, task forces, events, groups, and committees. 

Yahrzeit Candles for Pittsburgh



In late October, Rabbi Stanway was invited by the Grade 7 class for a lesson on the Jewish traditions of death and dying with Mrs. Gross. We had planned to make yahrzeit candles as part of the exercise led by Principal Stella Stanway.

Quite by terrible coincidence, the terror in Pittsburgh happened the Shabbat before. And so the exercise and the class took on a more somber tone. The students all created yahrzeit candles and dedicated them to the members of Tree of Life synagogue in memory of those lost. Rabbi Stanway sent the candles along with a note of condolence from Beth Miriam.

It also happened that, after school that day, one of our congregants shared with the rabbi and Stella Jeruzalmi Stanway that one of her sorority sisters' father had been one of the slain. She tearfully accepted one of the candles with our love to send her sorority sister.

The creation of these candles became an expression of our sorrow and especially the sorrow of the Grade 7 class. But more than just an expression of sorrow, this class' actions brought immediate comfort to one of our own.


