Rabbi Cy Stanway






Clara Gee has been a huge part of the art community, the greater Jewish community, and most importantly for us, our Temple community. What I loved most about the evening was her wit.

Mazal Tov, Judy Berg!





As we look forward to honoring Judy Berg at Shabbat service on June 7, here are events over the past two months in SA/SJ involving TBM congregants:

- TBM congregants helping lead a Passover Seder at The Atria Assisted Living residence;
- Rings of Peace vigils in late March beautifully documented by Rickie Kashdan and Rebecca Levin in last month's TBM bulletin;
- Shabbat service May 10 honoring TBM's centenarian Clara Gee Ziment

Clara Gee was surrounded at TBM's Shabbat service May 10 by a large crowd of friends and well-wishers who joined in joy and in prayer to celebrate her 100th birthday. Rabbi Stanway recounted how Clara Gee's life has been filled with social action impact on TBM and everyone around Clara Gee, as she exemplifies the Midrash's benchmarks of energy and kindness, beauty, and wisdom, reflecting the ages 7, 20 and 100, which the Midrash notes total up to 127, the age that matriarch Sarah was able to bear children. Clara Gee came up to the bimah to thank all whom she has known and befriended over all her years. She refused any credit for being 100 years old, and said that her experience has been that she lived each day, and then, there was another. Clara Gee modestly neglected to mention what seems like her clear and enduring vision, to connect with and celebrate all people, such as through the organization MCWRET gathering people of many faiths to celebrate differences and similarities among us. An exhibit in TBM's lobby offered a small taste of Clara Gee's long career providing her unique cartoonist and artist's perspective on the world, which will continue to influence her viewers' attitudes about social action and social justice.


-The annual Jewish Reform Action Center's Consultation on Conscience May 19-21 in Washington DC.




A candid moment in the Religious School with Rabbi Stanway holding an 'Ask Me Anything' session on his office floor with one of the school classes.

an easy task. Peppered throughout the year were activities where students got to work with other classes, creating and cementing relationships.


