

A VERY DIFFERENT 5781

When the Shelter at Home orders were first given in March for this new Coronavirus, most of us assumed we would be freely out and about by the summer. Time brought new scientific facts though, and we are now encouraged to physically distance and wear face coverings when in public.

The Days of Awe, which begin in mid-September, take much time and preparation. We needed to make a decision early, without knowing what measures would be allowed by the governor in a few months, if we would or should have our traditional indoor High Holiday services. With careful and conscientious consideration for the health and safety of our congregants, it was determined to forgo services inside the temple, and instead have them relayed remotely. Apparently most other congregations nation-wide are doing exactly the same thing after struggling with the question.

Although it will be truly disappointing for us to not be in the sanctuary to see and hear our clergy deliver the songs and messages we annually look forward to, Rabbi Cy and Cantor Marnie (who will lead us from the bimah) had already been reworking the services to make them as spiritually rewarding. Evening services will be shorter and begin earlier, and the morning/afternoon services will also be shorter with breaks in the middle. Basic dates and times are listed below, but not all details have been worked out yet. Check for updates online, and the temple website. There are plans for the machzor (prayer book) pages to be displayed online.

TBM is an egalitarian community where traditional families, LGBTQ people, interfaith families and partners, singles, Jews-by-Choice and anyone interested in finding a sanctuary will be welcome. You will always be embraced regardless of your background, previous affiliation, or Jewish knowledge. We believe that you are a vital part of the Jewish future and present and we are a place in which to nurture and protect your Jewish self.

Join us anytime for a class, a service or an event.



Another change is that the Yizkor booklet will only be available online. Forms will be sent in the mail during the summer, for those who wish to participate.

The good news is no tickets are needed for any of the services! We do still require that dues be paid 100% by September 1st, as the By-Laws state, in order to be a member in good standing. Guests will also be welcomed to join us, with an understanding that a donation to the temple would be appreciated.

Yes, this will be a very different start to the Hebrew year 5781. Many of the things that made the Days of Awe so meaningful will have to wait until next year. Still, the Rabbi and Cantor are working hard to make these days as meaningful as possible.

For many of us, though, this will be the first time ever we won't be in a temple for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. It may feel as though we are being unfaithful, but preserving our health and life is paramount in Judaism. We ultimately will get through this pandemic and hope to see each other soon and 'in our day.'

*Seating will be spaced 6 feet apart and in groups of one, two, three, and four chairs for families. Other arrangements can be accommodated as needed.

*You will be asked to come around the back, and not enter through the temple.

*Service prayer booklets will be on a table in the back which you will help yourself to. An Usher will be stationed nearby, but not distribute them. After each service you should return the booklet to a receptacle on the table. Those booklets will not be used the following week, but be rotated.

*Unfortunately, we will be asked not to sing.

*Hand sanitizer will be available.


*There will be no Oneg.

*One person at a time in the restrooms, which will be sanitized periodically.

*We reserve the right to modify, or cancel things if the current situation changes in any way.

FROM THE RABBI

CY STANWAY




We don't always get to live a vital Jewish value so visibly every single day of our lives. But, in this era of COVID-19, we get to do exactly that. The Jewish value is pikuach nefesh - saving a life. It is hard to fathom how simply going to a store to pick up some groceries has the same impact on others' lives as driving safely. Yet, here we are.

Now that the world is starting to open up again we are seeing what the scientists told us was going to happen. Since the virus is still very virulent and people think that, because the government alleges it is safe to go out of quarantine, too many people are complacent. It is a simple form of denial, of course, and its effects will be devastating to so many people. Thousands will get sick. Many will die needlessly. And these people won't die giving up their lives for something noble. They may die because they wanted a bagel. It is a shande.

And there are those who will die and get sick not because of anything they did but because of what others did or, in this case, didn't do. They didn't wear a mask. If you wear a mask, you are telling the world that you care about others. If you wear a mask you are telling the world that pikuach nefesh means something to you.

We have been a different synagogue in many ways since we closed down for quarantine just after COVID-19 began. And, for the foreseeable future, we will be trying to navigate the way through the new normal, whatever that is. Online classes have been running full steam. Online services are running full steam. And families and I are working together to try to

figure out how to do the b'nai mitzvah ceremonies balancing keeping everyone safe and healthy while having a meaningful event for the family and the student. We are getting creative, that's for sure.



But the spectre of the Days of Awe is looming. Never in anyone's recollection, has a Days of Awe had to be altered because of a public health crisis. Yet, here we are. To that end, even - or especially - the synagogue has to make some decisions to fulfill the mitzvah of pikuach nefesh. And so, unless some miracle happens, it looks like the Days of Awe services will be online.

The temple is installing an online video system to stream services from the sanctuary. I have been editing an online Mishkan HaNefesh so you will be able to follow the service. The cantor, keyboardist and I will be the only ones in the sanctuary and she will be singing to cyberspace and I will be preaching and teaching to an empty sanctuary. Services will be shortened, of course and the longer services will be divided into two parts with a break in between. Will we get it right? To be honest, I have absolutely no idea. The only thing I can promise is that the cantor and I will try and that is why we are actually planning two kinds of services simultaneously: the miracle service if the virus suddenly disappears (unlikely) and the online service.

We have set ourselves the highest of bars: making the services mean something without the typical uplifting space and setting we are used to. I take comfort in knowing that every single one of my colleagues is in the same place and

hundreds of us are putting our heads together to figure out how to make this work. The underlying mitzvah, though, is pikuach nefesh. The liturgy 'Who by fire, who by water, who by plague...' is something we all take very seriously.

In some fashion or another, we have all had to adapt how we do things and adopt different practices. Since the advent of this curse, I have had to learn to be a lay-video producer and director as well as an online rabbi and counselor. The religious school has had to punt and recreate itself (which it did without missing a beat). And the Board of Trustees had to navi-

gate the needs of the community with the reality of the virus which it did with serious thought and great professionalism. We all accepted the reality that pikuach nefesh makes us sacrifice something for something greater. We will continue to do so because we care about you. That is what it all boils down to. Beth Miriam cares and even though we may not shake hands and hug, that day IS coming and what a day it will be but, until that moment arrives, we will continue to care, to listen to your concerns, and to make every effort to keep everyone healthy.

Keep your mask on. Let the world know you care.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL








